# **<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>**

# **1.1 INTRODUCTION**

Sri Jagadguru Murugharajendra College of Arts, Science & Commerce, Chandravalli, Chitradruga was started under the aegis of S.J.M. Vidyapeetha. SJM college was established in 1969 and managed by S.J.M. Vidyapeetha®. The SJM Vidyapeetha is an apex body established by the Math to promote higher education throughout the country with special emphasis to rural areas. The Math also facilitated hostels in most of the 120 institutions comprising of Medical, Dental, Engineering, Polytechnic, Nursing and 05 UG colleges.

SJM Math – Sri Jagadguru Murugharajendra Math located on the outskirts of fort city, Chitradurga, Karnataka State, inherits the culture of Sharanas of 12th century A.D. The lineage of its pontiffs begins with Sri Allama Prabhu Holy seats of pontiff of this Math called as "SHOONYAPEETHA", the Chair seats of Anubhava Mantapam. The Math has a long history of 800 years It is well known for its social, economic and educational activities.

SJM college of Arts, Science and Commerce was the brain child of His Holiness Jagadguru Sri Mallikarjuna Murugharajendra Swamiji to provide higher education to the rural people of Chitradurga and also the entire state of Karnataka. The college is situated in a splendid place called, "Chandravalli", which has a panoramic view of mountains, greenery, caves and a historically significant "Chandravalli Tank" on Holalkere Road in the outskirts of the city. The college has a 5.22 acres of land with all necessary infrastructures in all aspects. Academic Excellence is the top priority of our college.

The affiliation of the college was shifted from Kuvempu University to Davanagere University from the academic year 2010-11. The college is fit under 2f and 12(B) and a Grant-in-Aid college.

The college has got accreditation of cycle-1 at "B+" with 76.0 CGPA, cycle-2 at "B" grade with 2.82 CGPA and cycle-3 at "A" grade with 3.05 CGPA accredited on 27-03-2017. With the active role of IQAC, the college has ensured to enhance the academic quality, prepared a comprehensive Plan of Actions with the vision of implementation in short term and long term views. Our esteemed Management relentlessly supported the Institution in implementing its Vision and Mission statement. They have approved the Plan of Actions submitted by the Principal and provided necessary financial provisions for augmentation of infrastructural facilities, recruitment of full time teachers against the sanctioned posts.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

**Curricular Aspects** 

The SJM college of Arts, Science & Commerce is affiliated to Davangere University offering 03 UG programmes i.e., Arts, Science and Commerce. During the assessment period, the college had to follow CBCS and NEP pattern course curriculum. As and when the syllabus is revised / modified and newly introduced subject by the University, to enable the concerned faculty members to understand the overall objectives of the revised course curriculum, promote them to participate orientation programmes organized by the University and also invites academicians, professionals and experts to deliver special lectures.

10 faculty members were in the panel of BoS belonging to Kannada, Hindi, History, Commerce, Political Science, Physics, Chemistry, Economics, Zoology and Sociology. Many of them have rendered their academic expertisation in framing the course curriculum as per NEP pattern and 06 faculty members were in the panel of BoE.

The college has organized orientation programme on NEP pattern of course curriculum introduced by the University for the academic year 2021-22.

On the occasion of release of NEP based text book in Kannada subject published by our faculty, conducted a workshop on Optional Kannada. More than 80 faculty members from different colleges were participated along with students.

Established commerce laboratory to conduct course enrichment activities and organized a special lecture on (a) Micro and Macro Economics (b) Law and Life (c) Time Management (d) Law and Social Change (e) People

### Management.

In addition to the existing course curriculum, based on the feedback suggestions, the college has successfully completed Institutional level 22 certificate / value added courses and the same is continued during the current academic year 2023-24.

The college has some of the support service units i.e., NSS with 02 units consisting of 100 volunteers each, NCC, YRC, History Forum, Women Empowerment Cell. With the help of these units, the college regularly conducts awareness lecture on cross-cutting issues.

Every department have organized course enrichment activities based on CBCS and NEP based syllabi.

To identify the overall view of the course curriculum, in coordination with IQAC collected feedback on course curriculum from stakeholders and based on the outcome of the analysis and suggestions reflected in the feedback form, the college has implemented the requisition on priority basis. Some of the department also communicated to the Chairman, BoS of different department, Davanagere University for further modification / revision of course curriculum.

**Teaching-learning and Evaluation** 

In the midst of 03 GFGC, 04 Private Aided and 03 Private degree college in the surrounding place of Chitradurga, the Institution intake is sustained with 47%. Majority of the students enrolled to the Institution are from rural belt and many of them economically weaker. More than 90% of the students enrolled are belonging to reserved category.

During the assessment period, due to the superannuation of 14 permanent teachers, the Management has recruited temporary full time teachers against the sanctioned post and hence the overall student teacher ratio is 24:1.

The college has a conducive atmosphere and creates academic ambience by providing necessary infrastructural facilities and enhancement of learning resources for the effective delivery of course curricular. For example, during the assessment period, constructed 05 additional class rooms, upgraded all science laboratories, language lab and computer laboratories.

To provide experiential learning to the students, the college has facilities like; Computer Lab, Commerce Lab, Language Lab, 05 science laboratories, Botanical and Medicinal garden, Network Resource Centre, INFLIBNET N-list, etc.

In addition to the engaging classes and practical sessions, to ensure the active involvement of the students in respective subjects, they are asked to present a topic at in-house seminars, submit the assignment in time, experiment assignments in the laboratories, use the INFLIBNET n-list, etc.

Under NEP Skill Enhancement courses i.e., Artificial Intelligence and Digital Fluency are taught to the students from the qualified faculty and with the help of ICT students were made to understand the subject effectively.

Established a Commerce Laboratory and guide students about the Banking operations, awareness on Insurance Sectors, financial sectors, share market trends, guide them the procedure for opening DEMAT account, trading, etc.

Based on the prescribed syllabi "Minor Research Project" in V semester, the Department guided students in the preparation of Project Report.

Guided students in the preparation of project report based on the prescribed syllabus on, "New Venture Creation Management".

The department has upgraded the language laboratory. The department conducts crash course for the students who are weak in English communicative skills and provide them sufficient scope to exercise in the laboratory.

The mechanism for internal and external assessment is transparent and guided students grievances related to internal and external assessment. More than 392 students have got their better result after evaluation / challenge evaluation applied to the University.

The college publishes POs and COs of the programme on Institutional Website, communicated to stakeholders through orientation programmes, inaugural function of Curricular, cocurricular and extra curricular activities,

### during the class hours, counselling to students at the time of admission, etc.

Signed 14 MoU with recognized organizations for the purpose of overall career prospects of students.

**Research, Innovations and Extension** 

Organized 01 National level and University level seminar respectively. During the last five years, conducted more than 54 webinar at National and State level.

Faculty members have published 36 research articles in recognized academic journals with ISSN / ISBN, 06 text books as per University prescribed syllabi and 02 chapter edited.

Establishment of IPR Cell. Conducted a short term course on IPR Law with the duration of 32 hours meant for students. During the programme 38 students were the beneficiaries. Organized a State Level webinar on, "Intellectual Property Rights" and Under FDP conducted 01 week State level webinar on "IPR".

As per the circular issued by the the Department of Collegiate Education, Government of Karnataka, some of the faculty members have created course content based on course curriculum and submitted to the Department of Collegiate Education and Davanagere University for further processes.

To encourage every faculty members to inculcate research culture and academic upgradation, established a Research Committee with the objective of promoting research culture among staff and students to the greater extent. Conducted survey on old age home SSKS oldage home in Chitradurga Town, female foeticide and economic survey on chikkagondanahalli village. The overall impact of the survey has enabled the Institution to communicate the beneficiaries of the old age home with regard to government schemes for old age homes.

The Department of Economics, Sociology & Kannada jointly conducted socio economical analysis of Milk Producers Cooprative Society of Godabanahal village in Chitradurga Dist. The Department of History & Kannada organised visit to ancient monuments around historical place in Tamatkal near Chitradurga. In association with the Department of Political Science, college has organized national level seminar on, "Human Rights" in the academic year 2021-22.

The college has established Incubation centre. In the Mathematics Lab, installed Scilab and Maxima software. This has enabled the department to explore on composing the programme coding for related topics.

The college has support service units i.e., NCC, YRC, 2 units of NSS consisting of 100 student volunteers each, Women Empowerment Cell, etc. With the help of these units, college has conducted good number of extension activities at the neighbourhood community. More than 45 collaborative extension activities have been conducted by the college at neighbourhood community.

The college has received recognition by the Officer, Gram Panchayat, Panchayat Development Office, Govt.of Karnataka, SDM Dental College & Hospital, Department of the Veterinary, Govt.of Karnataka.

The overall impact of the students active participation in extension activities recognized by the Nodel Office, Davanagere University, Davanagere and awarded 03 students as NSS Best Volunteers.

The college has signed 13 MoU and conducted more than 20 activities based on the objectives of respective MoU.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has academic ambience and conducive atmosphere. With the active support of our esteemed Management, Principal ensures the augmentation of infrastructural facilities and enhancement of learning resources based on the recommendations of stakeholders on priority mode. The entire campus is surrounded with 5.22 acres of land with the built up area of 3967.14 sq meter. During the assessment period, with the support of our esteemed Management, college has newly constructed 05 class rooms, thereby college has altogether 20 spacious and well ventilated class rooms. Out of which, 06 class rooms upgraded with ICT enabled.

For the purpose of conduct of cocurricular and extra curricular activities, college has spacious seminar hall with ICT enabled which is renovated by the Alumni Association with the estimated budget of Rs.10.00 lac. The college has ICT enabled Seminar hall with seating capacity of 200. The major events of the college is organized at the Anubhav Manthap Auditorium at SJM Math

To enable students to gain practical knowledge and skills, college has facilitated necessary laboratories. College has Computer lab, Language Lab, Commerce Lab, 05 science laboratories, botanical and medicinal garden.

Computing Equipment:

- Mathematics lab installed with Scilab and Maxima. This has enabled to solve complex mathematical formulae.
- College has trained commerce students on Advance MS-Excel and Tally ERP to equip them competent enough for getting employability at different sectors.

The college has a qualified and competent Physical Education Director with the specialization of volleyball. Students are encouraged to actively involved in any of the sports activities either indoor or outdoor games.

The college has 09 station gymnasium. Students are motivated to utilise the available facilities and Physical Education Director regularly coaches accordingly. Gymnasium is kept open 6.00am to 8.00am.

The college has a qualified, competent and experienced permanent Librarian. The college has an independent and spacious central library with built up area of 608.75 Sq.mtr. The library has a overall 200 seating capacity, provided separate reading provision for the staff.

Library has a separate provision for the Network Resource Centre with 20 desktop and high bandwidth internet connectivity. The Library is enriched with 43970 text books and Reference books, Encyclopaedia of Britannica with 10 volumes. Library also has Gazettier, Old Mysore Gazettier etc.

During the assessment period, 834 books have been added and subscribed 11

academic journals pertaining to Science, Commerce and Arts. Library is also established SC/ST book bank facility and students belonging to the reserved category are encouraged with additional 04 text books comparing to 02 text books for other students.

**Student Support and Progression** 

During the last five years more than 73% of the students were benefitted different government scholarships. Conducted capacity building activities on (1) Soft skills i.e., Computer Typewriting Skills, (2) Language and Communication Skills i.e., Communicative Skills, Communication Skills in English (3) Life Skills conducted Training programmes on Yoga, National Awareness Programe on Build the Enterprise of Your Dreams, Enterprise Your Dreams, Entrepreneurship Motivation Camp, etc. (4) Computing skills activities on (a) Crash course in MS-Excel, etc.

The college has active Career Guidance and Placement. Invited academicians, professionals and experts from coaching centre to deliver awareness lecture on Career Guidance and Competitive Examinations. Invited bureaucrats and successful alumni to motivate students to appear for competitive examinations and also enlighten them on the systematic preparation for any competitive examinations, Conducted Placement Drive. More than 14 MNC and local companies have participated. More than 359 students cross the district have participated and more than 20 outgoing students got placed at different companies. Students aspiring for immediate placement, the Career Guidance and Placement Cell with its connectivity with the local Institutions, organizations, factories and companies enabled students to employed.

To encourage students to appear and crack the competitive examinations, the college has subscribed 13 magazines and journals. More than 55% of the outgoing students placed at different sectors and continued for higher education and similarly, more than 12% of the students qualified in different competitive examinations.

The college has timely redressal mechanism and formed statutory cells i.e., Prevention of Sexual Harrassment Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, SC/ST Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell. Invited eminent lawyers, police personnel, NGO to

### deliver awareness lectures.

During the assessment period, the college has recorded more than 35 achievements in sports and cultural events at University, State and National level.

The college has organized 02 times zonal / University level sports tournament. During the last five years deputed more than 250 students to compete in Sports and Cultural events organized at University, State and National level.

The college has a registered Alumni Association. For the overall career prospects of the students at large, their active participation and contribution boosted benefitted by students studying in the college. The college has provided a separate room as "Alumni Block" to facilitate them to conduct their meeting. Depending upon the duration of the meeting, the college provides them Tea, snacks and lunch during their meeting.

### Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is one of the premier and first higher education Institution established in the year 1969 in the vicinity of Chitradurga District. Our Institution has been protected, guided and supported by our esteemed President who is also a religious head of Shri Jagadguru Murugarajendra Vidya Peeta, Chitradurga. The President has empowered the Governing Body which acts as a liaison between Management and Institution to ensure necessary support and guidance for effective implementation of Institution's Vision and Mission statement.

With the active support of our esteemed Management and Governing Body, college has successfully implemented the perspective plans drawn soon after the previous cycle accreditation status.

- Promotional benefit for 07 permanent full time teachers as per the UGC guidelines during the last five years and 05 for permanent non teaching staff from peon to Attendar , Attender to SDA, SDA to FDA respectively.
- Incremental benefit for all the permanent teaching and non teaching staff from time to time.
- Incremental benefit to the management recruited staff and sustenance of their service.
- Resolution to 05 permanent faculty members for registration of research leading to Ph.D. at different Universities.
- Permitted 03 senior faculty members for foreign visit.

Almost all the faculty members have undertaken FDP, Crash courses, RC, OC totalling to 183 completion certificates with the teachers and similarly, the college has organized 02 times MDP for teaching and non teaching staff.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance. The IQAC prepares the Plan of Actions in consultation with respective Department Heads and monitor the implementation of the Plan of Action from time to time.

In association with IQAC, the college has conducted more than 45 collaborative activities, i.e., seminars, conferences, special lectures, sports event, cultural event, Entrepreneurship lectures, Water conservations, awareness on NAAC revised manual, etc. Institutionalise in conducting 22 certificate / value added courses.

**Institutional Values and Best Practices** 

With the help of the Department of Economics conducted Gender Audit and based on the suggestions of the report, college has conducted good number of activities on gender equity and sensitization and also enabled the Institution to involve girl students representations in different committees / cells.

The college has an active Women Empowerment Cell. To promote gender

sensitisation, the Cell regularly invited academicians, professionals, lady entrepreneurs, successful alumnus to deliver special lecture on gender issues, gender sensitization, etc.

The college has made efforts to provide an inclusive environment, promoting tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal socioeconomic, and other diversity.

The Science Departments collectively organizes special activities on the occasion of National Science day on 28th February every year. During the occasion, students at large are enlightened on Air Pollution, personalities of eminent scientists, innovations in science field, etc.

The Department of Commerce conducts a Commerce Exhibition to explore professional values, develop the marketing strategy, , sale of handicrafts, artificial ear rings, stationeries, promotion of Khadi dresses, interaction with entrepreneurs, commerce related quiz competitions, etc.

**Response:** 

The SJM college of Arts, Science & Commerce is affiliated to Davangere University offering 03 UG programmes i.e., Arts, Science and Commerce. During the assessment period, the college had to follow CBCS and NEP pattern course curriculum. The Institution adheres to the structure of the syllabus prescribed by the University from time to time and for the effective delivery of course curriculum, the college is dedicated to facilitate necessary infrastructural facilities and enhances the learning resources. As and when the syllabus is revised / modified and newly introduced subject by the University, to enable the concerned faculty members to understand the overall objectives of the revised course curriculum, promote them to participate orientation programmes organized by the University and also invites academicians, professionals and experts to deliver special lectures. The college ensures to procure learning resources based on the course curriculum.

10 faculty members were in the panel of BoS belonging to Kannada, Hindi, History, Commerce, Political Science, Physics, Chemistry, Economics, Zoology and Sociology. Many of them have rendered their academic expertisation in framing the course curriculum as per NEP pattern and 06 faculty members were in the panel of BoE.

Soon after the notification of University Calendar of Events, the Principal convenes staff meeting with the agenda of discussions having (a) Review of previous semester end result (b) Preparation of Time Table (d) Institutional Calendar of Event (c) Allocation of subjects (d) Review of workload. The Principal do collect the Plan of Actions from each department and accordingly provides necessary financial provisions for

### implementing them.

To engage every faculty members during the pandemic circumstances, the college has encouraged them to conduct virtual mode of classes. Many of them have prepared their lectures based on course curriculum and uploaded them on Institutional website, youtube channel, etc and also provided a separate desktop along with earphone for engaging the virtual classes at the staff room.

Following are some of the implementations based on calendar of events during the last five years –

- The college has organized orientation programme on NEP pattern of course curriculum introduced by the University for the academic year 2021-22.

The college has some of the support service units i.e., NSS with 02 units consisting of 100 volunteers each, NCC, YRC, History Forum, Women Empowerment Cell. With the help of these units, the college regularly conducts awareness lecture on cross-cutting issues such as Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability. The cross cutting issues are reflected in some of the course curriculum i.e., Political Science, Hindi, Kannada, Sociology, English, Commerce, Physics, Zoology, Botany, Chemistry.

Activities include moral education, tree awareness, bird water bowl installation, campus beautification, special lectures on the Indian Constitution of India and national integration programs. #### 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

#### **Response:**

The college has a conducive atmosphere and creates academic ambience by providing necessary infrastructural facilities and enhancement of learning resources for the effective delivery of course curricular. For example, during the assessment period, constructed 05 additional class rooms, installed necessary software in the computer lab.

The college has some of the facilities i.e., Computer Lab, Commerce Lab, Language Lab, Network Resource Centre, INFLIBNET N-list, updated science laboratories, etc.

**Experiential Learning:** 

The current structure of the course curriculum of CBCS and NEP, most of the core subject highlights field work, study tours, experiments in laboratories. In addition to the conventional mode of teaching, most of the teachers engage lectures in ICT enabled class rooms and strive their best to create academic interest among students. To enable students to understand the subject, given additional assignment, experiments and guided them to exercise in the laboratories.

In addition to the engaging classes and practical sessions, to ensure the active involvement of the students in respective subjects, they are asked to present a topic at in-house seminars, submit the assignment in time, experiment assignments in the laboratories, use the INFLIBNET n-list, etc.

Under NEP Skill Enhancement courses i.e., Artificial Intelligence and Digital Fluency are taught to the students from the qualified faculty and with the help of ICT students were made to understand the subject effectively.

**Department of Science (Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany and Zoology)** 

• Students are given sufficient assignments to experiment in the laboratory.

- The Botany students are guided to identify the nature of the plants and prepare the analysis report.
- The Zoology students are guided to prepare vermi compost.
- The Department of Chemistry guided students on Water and Soil Analysis.

# **Department of Commerce**

- Established a Commerce Laboratory and guide students about the Banking operations, awareness on Insurance Sectors, financial sectors, share market trends, guide them the procedure for opening DEMAT account, trading, etc.
- Based on the prescribed syllabi "Minor Research Project" in V semester, the Department guided students in the preparation of Project Report.
- Guided students in the preparation of project report based on the prescribed syllabus on, "New Venture Creation Management".
- Some of the subject i.e., Accountancy, Management Accounting, GST, Financial Management, etc., in addition to the class room lecturing, to create interest among students, the concerned faculty members provide additional assignment to the students, expose them on commerce related application softwares in the computer laboratory.

# **English Department**

The department has upgraded the language laboratory. The department conducts crash course for the students who are weak in English communicative skills and provide them sufficient scope to exercise in the laboratory.

**Participative Learning:** 

Irrespective of learning level of the students, every student is encouraged to actively participate in group discussions, in-house seminar, intra class competitions, etc.

The department of Science regularly conducts field work and study tours. During the last five years, they have visited (a) Oil Industry (b) Wind Mill (c) Jogamatti Forest (d) Bandipur – National Park (e) Dandeli Forest area (f) Mysore Zoo, etc. This has helped all students to understanding comprehensive view of the course curriculum.

**Problem Solving Methodology:**

#### **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**

#### 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

**Response:** 

During the assessment period, college had to follow CBCS and NEP pattern of course curriculum. Students are well informed about the structure of the internal assessment during the orientation programme.

In addition to the regular classes, the students active participation is tracked through their attendance to the theory and practical classes, active participation in curricular, cocurricular and extra curricular activities.

To help students in their career prospects, the college has implemented Mentorship mechanism. Every faculty is allocated mentee and entrusted them to guide, motivate and create academic enthusiasm in mentee to complete their graduation with utmost successful.

Faculty members do collect the suggestions and opinions from every class representatives on curricular aspects and accordingly, the respective department do conduct seminars, workshops, group discussions, course implication in current trend of job market and higher education, etc.

The college ensures necessary provisions, facilities and academic ambience to cater the diversed students with the holistic view to shape the career aspiration of every student and accordingly to monitor the overall academic proficiency of the students, the IQAC along with concerned faculty members do analyse the learning levels of the students at the entry level, performance in internal test and outcome of the semester end result. The analysis report indicate the learning level of the students and to encourage slow learners to cope up the course curriculum, Remedial Classes are engaged by respective faculty members.

The college adopted Mentorship Mechanism and accordingly every mentor guides allocated mentees on career aspects, engage extra classes, provides additional learning resources, motivate on personality development, identify their difficulties during their studies and accordingly, resolve their problems by providing necessary counselling, financial assistance for the remittance of fees, examination fees, etc.

The college has an active Examination Commitee. The Committee conducts the Internal Test as per the scheduled calendar of event of the

college. Collects the question papers in sealed envelop from respective faculty members 01 prior to commencement of the scheduled examination. Faculty members are instructed to evaluate the answer sheets within 2 days of the completion of examination and tabulated internal marks should be submitted to the Examination Committee. Every faculty members distribute the evaluated answer sheets to the students during the class hours and collect them back. This process has enabled students to know their actual learning levels.

Students who could not able to attend internal examination due to genuine and valid reasons, in such cases, they are given scope to submit additional assignment within stipulated time period.

Students who are with talents and skills, to nurture their abilities to perform their best at competitions organized by neighbouring Institutions and University, they are motivated with proper coaching and guidance before competing at various levels.

**Grievances of External Examination:** 

Soon after the announcement of the semester end result, the Examination Committee notifies students about the last date of application of Revaluation, Challenge Evaluation, etc. Before applying for revaluation, challenging evaluation, etc., students are instructed to get the guidance from respective faculty members. Following are some of the grievances of students enable them to get resolved through proper guidance and communication to the concerned authorities of Evaluation Centre, Davanagere University.

# 2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

# **Response:**

During the assessment period, college had to confine CBCS and NEP pattern of course curriculum. Soon after the revision / modification of course curriculum, with the active role of IQAC, college publishes POs and COs of the programme on Institutional Website, communicated to stakeholders through orientation programmes, inaugural function of Curricular, cocurricular and extra curricular activities, during the class hours, counselling to students at the time of admission, etc.

To attain the PO and CO, the college has augmented necessary infrastructural facilities and also enhanced learning resources at the central library, updated all the laboratories, upgraded computer laboratories and also encouraged faculty members for attending professional development programmes organized by various competent Institutions and similarly conducted course enrichment programme effectively by every department.

As and when the course curriculum is revised / modified and newly introduced subject by the University, the Department Heads along with departmental colleagues analyse the scope of the programme in the area of higher education, employability, competitive examinations and entrepreneurship. The overall impact of Programme Outcome is published on Institutional website, news papers, college Notice Board, Central Library, etc. For the effective implementation of POs and Cos, the college has organized workshop on NEP pattern of course curriculum i.e., Degree Language Text Book Release and workshop conducted on 25.01.2022.

At the beginning of the programmes, all the students especially first year students are informed about POs and COs. The faculty members analyse the PO & CO and accordingly prepare the comprehensive plan of actions to attaining PO and CO.

At the beginning of each programme the faculty members thoroughly explain the outcomes to the students. They also conduct brain storming sessions to define all these outcomes. The faculty members organize and attend workshops, seminars, conferences, refresher courses, etc., which can throw more light on POs and COs.

Our institution has adopted the following methods to assess the students' attainment of POs and COs.

**Direct Methods:** 

Assessment: COs are assessed through performance in Internal Test, semester end result, Home Assignments and Lab records. The COs are mapped against each question and CO analysis is carried out by faculty for each course.

The contribution of COs are assessed in high, moderate and low levels, towards the attainment of PO and CO.

The students are motivated to consult their teachers to get the proper guidance on revised course curriculum ie, NEP.

Experiential learning in the form of organizing workshops, seminars, group discussions, lab experiments, mini projects is used to evaluate students' organisational, leadership qualities and learning abilities.

**Indirect Methods:** 

Feedback on curriculum from stakeholders of higher education especially teachers, students, alumni, parents and management is collected.

An annual survey of student satisfaction is also done to identify various variables that will be taken into consideration when formulating future strategies.

Alumni Survey : This survey is conducted annually to identify the scope of the PO and CO and its compatibility to the current professional field and higher education.

The institution takes the Placement record and higher education details from the Career Guidance and Placement to identify the scope of PO and CO for the employability at different sectors.

**Response:** 

The college offers 03 UG programmes and has altogether 13 departments. As and when the University revised / modified / introduce new subject, in such cases, the college invites academicians, professionals and expert to enlighten teachers the overall concept of the course curriculum and similarly, the college deputes faculty members to attend orientation / workshop on revised / modified course curriculum organized by University and neighbouring Institutions.

To ensure the effective implementation of the course curriculum, every department seeks the necessary facilities and accordingly, soon after the introduction of the NEP pattern of course curriculum, the college has enhanced good number of text books based on NEP pattern of course curriculum, given scope to the faculty members for publishing the text books, updated and upgraded computer lab, language lab with necessary software, science laboratories. Based on the current course curriculum, every department engaged students in field work, study tours, guided them for the preparation of micro projects, surveys, etc.

For attaining the PO and CO, following are the initiatives taken up by respective department to create academic interest among students –

The current pattern of course curriculum specifically highlights field work / study tours / project report, etc.

Signed 14 MoU with recognized organizations for the purpose of overall career prospects of students.

The Department of Commerce has developed Commerce Laboratory and guide students on Banking operations, Financial Institutions, Share Market, Trading, etc.

The Department of English conducts Communicative English classes through Language Laboratory.

The Department of History explore students on Inscription, Old Coin, currency and regularly conducts study tours at different historical places. Formed History Forum with its objective to prepare students about the ancient, medieval, contemporary Indian History, Modern Indian and European History, etc.

The Department of Sociology, encourages and guides students on field work, survey, etc., to enable them to inculcate social values and responsibilities.

The Department of Political Science, conducts special lectures on constitutional values, organizes study tours to Gram Panchayat, etc.

The concerned faculty members from science, regularly conducts study tours, organises interactions with eminent scientists, assign sufficient experiment at laboratories so as to gain the knowledge on particular topic of syllabi.

Some of the department i.e., Kannada and Economics have developed the e-content and submitted to the Department of Collegiate Education, Govt.of Karnataka.

Almost all the core subject department, have invited academicians, professionals and experts to deliver special lecture based on course curriculum and current trend. For example; Invited experts from Indian Institute of Sciences, Kuvempu University, Davanagere University, etc.

**Evaluation of Attainment:** 

Soon after the completion of the Internal Evaluation and announcement of semester end result by the University, the IQAC analyses the academic performance and maintain the track record of higher scorer, rank holders, gold medallist, cent percent scorer, etc. Students who score less than 10 as against 20 internal marks based on CBCS and 20 marks as against 40 internal marks based on NEP, identified them as Slow learners. To enable them to cope up the existing course curriculum and create academic interest in them, respective faculty members conduct Remedial Classes.

The overall analysis of the PO and CO highlights the following remarkable achievements by our outgoing students –

45% have continued for higher education after their graduation.

25% of them have placed at different sectors.

10% have qualified in different competitive examinations.

**Response:** 

The college has academic ambience and conducive atmosphere. Soon after the getting the previous accreditation status, the IQAC along with the staff reviewed the observations of PTR and their recommendations for the next five years and accordingly, college has drawn a plan of Actions for short term and long term. The college has made a financial provisions for professional development.

With the recommendations of the senior staff and IQAC, college has given ample scope to the faculty members in updating their academic proficiency. In view of this, college has subscribed 36 academic journals pertaining to different department. For the purpose of remote access on learning resources, the college has subscribed INFLIBNET N-list. Librarian regularly trains the staff and students about the effective use of INFLIBNET.

To encourage every faculty members to inculcate research culture and academic upgradation, established a Research Committee with the objective of promoting research culture among staff and students to the greater extent.

**Research Committee:**

The college has academic ambience and conducive atmosphere. With the active support of our esteemed Management, Principal ensures the augmentation of infrastructural facilities and enhancement of learning resources based on the recommendations of stakeholders on priority mode. The entire campus is surrounded with 5.22 acres of land with the built up area of 3967.14 sq meter. During the assessment period, with the support of our esteemed Management, college has newly constructed 05 class rooms, thereby college has altogether 20 spacious and well ventilated class rooms. Out of which, 06 class rooms upgraded with ICT enabled.

For the purpose of conduct of cocurricular and extra curricular activities, college has spacious seminar hall with ICT enabled which is renovated by the Alumni Association with the estimated budget of Rs.10.00 lac. The college has ICT enabled Seminar hall with seating capacity of 200. The major events of the college is organized at the Anubhav Manthap Auditorium at SJM Math (our esteemed Management), which is near vicinity of the college.

Based on the course curriculum, every department do conduct course enrichment activities i.e., invite academicians, professionals, experts to deliver special lectures based on course curriculum and also on current trends.

To enable students to gain practical knowledge and skills, college has facilitated necessary laboratories. College has Computer lab, Language

Lab, Commerce Lab. During the assessment period, college has ensured to get updated all the desktops for optimum utility.

**Computing Equipment:** 

- Mathematics lab installed with Scilab and Maxima. This has enabled to solve complex mathematical formulae.
- College has trained commerce students on Advance MS-Excel and Tally ERP to equip them competent enough for getting employability at different sectors.

During the assessment period, all the computers have been upgraded with necessary software based on course curriculum. During the assessment period, augmented 06 desktops including laptop. College has provided well configured desktop and printer along with necessary stationary at the staff room. This has given scope to the staff for creating LMS i.e., preparing the course content based on course curriculum and forwarded to the Davanagere University for ready references to the students.

The management supports the institution by preparing budgetary allocations for infrastructure requisitions, with a purchase committee and a Site Engineer responsible for maintenance.

**Cultural Activities:** 

To identify the hidden talents of the students, college conducts competition on drawing, essay writing, singing, quiz, elocution, debate, dance, etc. Students are encouraged to compete at various level and college provide them necessary accompanist, costumes, properties, TA/DA and also proper coaching before taking part in different competitions. College also has some of the equipments i.e., mics and speakers for the conduct of cultural activities.

**Sports Facilities:** 

College has a qualified and competent Physical Education Director with the specialization of volleyball. Students are encouraged to actively involved in any of the sports activities either indoor or outdoor games. College has given utmost scope to the sports laurels to get trained by competent coach before participating in sports tournaments organized by neighbouring Institutions and University. This has impacted good number of sports laurels achieved at University level and college has altogether 09 university blues during the assessment period.

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

#### **Response:**

The college has a qualified, competent and experienced permanent Librarian. The college has an independent and spacious central library with built up area of 608.75 Sq.mtr. The library has a overall 200 seating capacity, provided separate reading provision for the staff. Library has a separate provision for the Network Resource Centre with 20 desktop and high bandwidth internet connectivity. The Library is enriched with 43970 text books and Reference books, Encyclopaedia of Britannica with 10 volumes. Library also has Gazettier, Old Mysore Gazettier etc., these are optimally utilised by research scholar of different universities, neighbouring higher education Institutions, etc. College has formed Library Committee. Based on the recommendations of the Committee, Librarian places the order to the recognized Book depot for the supply of learning resources. During the assessment period, 834 books have been added and subscribed 11 academic journals pertaining to Science, **Commerce and Arts.** Library is also established SC/ST book bank facility and students belonging to the reserved category are encouraged with additional 04 text books comparing to 02 text books for other students.

During the assessment period, weeding out process has been done after

getting the permission from the Principal and Management. Library is also enriched with good number of learning resources on competitive examinations and e-learning resources on different subjects, personality development, English communication skills, etc.

Library has a reprography facility with subsidised rate. Has a New Arrival Wing to communicate students and staff about the upcoming learning resources.

To attract the good number of students towards optimum utility of the available learning resources, Librarian regularly conducts special programme i.e., Book Talk, Book Exhibition, Special lectures on the occasion of Ranganath Day – Founder of Librarian. Based on the optimum utility of the learning resources from the central library, such student is honoured with Best Library User Award along with one Moral / Professional related book and a pen, separately for Arts, Science and Commerce.

Library is partially automated with E-Lib software. The digitalization of the Library through e-Lib has resulted in the easy access of information, keep track record of Stock Register, Circulation, Stock Verification, Report generation of Weekly, Monthly and Annual usage by students and staff. The software also supports for OPAC. Students at large utilise the OPAC. The software is regularly maintained by AARGEES Business Solution under the provision of AMC.

College also has subscribed for INFLIBNET N-list for remote access of elearning resources. Librarian regularly trains students and staff to utilise the available facilities effectively for the overall enhancement of skills, knowledge on course curriculum and competitive examinations.

**Response:** 

Our college is one of the premier and the first higher education Institutions established in the year 1969 in the vicinity of Chitradurga District. Our Institution has been protected, guided and supported by our esteemed President who is also a religious head of Shri Jagadguru Murugarajendra Vidya Peeta, Chitradurga. The President has empowered the Governing Body which acts as a liaison between Management and Institution to ensure necessary support and guidance for effective implementation of Institution's Vision and Mission statement.

Following are the some of the evidence of Management Support for the overall development of the Institution during post accreditation process –

(4) Incremental benefit for all the permanent teaching and non teaching staff time to time.

(5) Incremental benefit to the management recruited staff and sustenance of their service.

(6) Resolution to 05 permanent faculty members for registration on research leading to Ph.D. at different Universities.

(7) Permitted 03 senior faculty members to foreign visit.

(8) Regularly organized professional development programmes for both teaching and non teaching staff including management recruited staff.

**NEP preparedness:** 

Our University has introduced NEP pattern of course curriculum with effect from academic year 2021-22. Following is the gist of implementation by the college to ensure the effective implementation of the NEP –

The Institution has a Governing Council, which formulates policies and take care of the overall administration including the academic development. The Principal of the Institution act as a member Secretary of the Governing Council. Various committees are constituted to assist the Principal in planning, execution and documentation of the academic and academic supported activities in the Institution.

- To improve the immunity power against the deadly diseases.
- To adopt a healthy dietary habits.
- To foster harmony in body, mind and environment.
- To prepare competent and confident personalities to serve the nation.
- To educate on health consequences of bad habits.
- To enlighten students on the effective practice of Yoga.
- To educate students on the importance of physical activities for better health.

## **CONTEXT:**

It is said that India has become the capital of diabetic patients in the world today. The latest medical survey reports have found out that the present day youth as young as 20 years old are falling prey to noncommunicable diseases like diabetic, hypertension etc., linked to unhealthy dietary habits, lack of physical activities or exercises and sedentary life styles. Moreover, there has been a lack of awareness among our students about this impending danger to their health and also the attitude of their parents towards the health of the children.

Therefore, there is an urgent need to take care of the health of the college students by initiating them to best practices and habits in their life. The knowledge on health acquired and practices life style adopted during school days and college days are to stay there in there adulthood and lay a strong foundation for healthy life in the rest of their life. Therefore, there is a greater need today to teach and make the students practice yoga, the greatest ancient Indian wisdom which is a panacea for all the illnesses physical, mental, cultural, social even spiritual.

**Practice:** 

For the purpose of conducting of medical check up, awareness programmes, the college has collaborative activities Basaveshwara Medical Hospital, Primary Health Centre, District Rotary Club, District Health Organization.

The college conducts regularly Yoga camps for students every year. A large number of students enthusiastically participate in these camps. A One-month certificate course on Yoga has been conducted for interested students. There is gymnasium inside the college campus, which is kept open during the working days since morning 7 am to 5 pm. A large number of students make use of the gym during the leisure hours. Special lectures to create awareness among students about keeping their health are arranged. specialist doctors and other health experts are invited to deliver lectures on health related issues for all the girl students the HB Test has been conducted. The lady doctors have delivered special lectures

on the common health problems faced by the girl students.

**Evidence of success :** 

All the students have shown keen interest in participating in special yoga camps. several students visit gymnasium daily for improving their physical powers and also participate in sports and games after class hours. Moreover there is a greater demand from the students to conduct these kind of yoga camps regularly for the benefit of all the students.

**Problems encountered:** 

No significant problems have been encountered. but there is lack of expert yoga teacher to conduct yoga. Lack of time for the student due to hectic academic activities like the classes, tests and examinations due to the semester system.

## **BEST PRACTICE -2**

**Objectives of the Practice:** 

- To make students to be aware of the preaching and teachings of social reformers and saint poets who wanted to establish a gender equality and casteless society.
- To instill values among the students by studying the Vachanas,
- To encourage students to inculcate moral and spiritual values.
- To promote students to inculcate social values and responsibilities.
- To become model citizen.

## The Context:

The modern society which is preoccupied with material progress needs to study and Follow and practice the preaching of great saints and social reformers of our country. Lord Basaveshwara-a social reformer in 12th century initiated a great social reform with the aim of fighting inequality based on caste, gender, etc. His teachings have a great relevance in the present context. Therefore, the students are very much required to study the life history and preachings and their contributions to the society. The teachings of the saint, poets has left a long lasting effect on the generations of people for centuries together.

So our young generation are the future of our country, should also develop moral and ethical practices in their life in this materialistic modern world. Therefore, our college conducts Vachana Kammata – an examination on poems of these great saint poets Every year.

The Practice :

The course is stretched with different title i.e., Arivina Andolana (Self Awareness), Nirmitee (Life values), Nirvachana (Spiritual literatures). These courses specifically highlights the moral, spiritual and ethical values which highlight the life example of Lord Basaveshwara and other greatest spiritual leaders (sharanaru) which has made greatest impact on the society. To inculcate the social, moral, spiritual and ethical values among students, in association with Sri Murughamath conducts the course for First semester to fifth semester students.

Ours is the only first education institution established back in 1967 in this area of Chitradurga city. The Institution is surrounded with 10 acres of land which has eco friendly and green campus. About 150 trees of different species including medicinal plants provide clean air and shade throughout the year.

The college has beautiful botanical garden along with medicinal plants. Good number of alumnus of the college are at the higher position as lawyers, chartered accountants, judges, politicians, religious heads, CEOs, entrepreneurs, professionals, academicians, etc. Our institution has also rain water harvesting facility with a large tank having the capacity to store 17000 litres of water at a time. The harvested water is optimally used for the maintenance of the garden, wash rooms, etc. At one end of the college campus a small check dam which has the capacity to store more than 50,000 litres of water has been constructed.
