Based on the I & D model the department of economics, the department of commerce and department of Political Science have taken initiation to introduce best practices. Format for presentation of best practices has been considered in practicing innovative activities.
 - 1. The Department of Economics: Title of best practices "Water Shed Development and Management, study area Chitradurga".
 - **2.** The Department of Commerce : Title of the best practices "e-Banking services in Chitradurga"
 - **3.** The Department of Political science : Title of the best practice "Awareness of Electorates"

Abstracts of best practices have been given for reference.

Title of the project: WATER SHED DEVELOPMENT AND MANAGEMENT Goal.

Availability of water is a prime necessity for any given area for human consumption as well as for animals and farming. To cope with the given resource utilization which plays a crucial role in the survival of the human activity. Natural resource, the rain water is an important climatic parameter which is to be disciplined in utilization and the awareness is brought in the rural people of the proper utilization of resources available in the given area at given time, as well as awareness brought in and extended to the needy, in the student community, since Chitradurga is in dry drought belt of Karnataka.

7.3Giv

To involve the rural community and students of our college, there is an attempt to bring together two sects of society and also make the students aware of the hardships faced by the farmers of this region.

The context:

Soil, water and vegetation are important gifts of nature and these three are inter-dependent that one cannot be managed efficiently without the other two. Rain water harvesting being as a climatic parameter needs to be disciplined when it comes in contact with the vegetation and soil. The deterioration of natural resources can be checked and total available resources properly utilized at the given time is to be developed only by adopting watershed approach.

Integrated water shed development approach encompassing soil and water conservation for farming system, animal husbandry and rural and community development is for overall development of the resource and people of an arid area like Chitradurga.

Judicious and economic use of rain water is to be ensured in average rainfall area. It is imperative that soil and water is conserved developed and managed efficiently to check soil erosion and land degradation.

Water shed management is one such approach for dry land forming in this area. It includes control of soil erosion, storage and conservation of rainwater, efficient use of conserved water and collection of runoff water, maintain soil moisture and increasing ground water level. Thus a comprehensive water shed development may be a long enduring answer to the sustainability of rain fed area of Chitradurga taluk / district.

The practice:

- 1. To generate an awareness among the staff and students about the importance of rain water harvesting and water shed management, the technical knowhow is introduced by interactive means.
- **2.** An action plan is chalked out by the staff and students together to tackle the problem.
- **3.** Students and staff visit the different villages to understand actual scenario.
- **4.** Students interview the farmers and local people of the village about the necessary steps tobe taken by them to tackle the problem.
- **5.** Interaction with the elderly people of the village to know what are the age old practices to withstand water in the soil for proper harvesting.

- 6. Survey is made by the students to know the actual problems faced by the rural people regarding the issue.
- 7. The survey gives ample awareness among the students to tackle the problem and they enthusiastically participated in the programme to get knowhow to eradicate the problem.
- 8. Educational visits are arranged to the villages and gain practical knowledge on the spot by the students and staff.
- 9. To understand the technology know-how, students and teachers visit the minor irrigation department and contact the technical authorities and interact with them.
- 10. Students visit the technical authorities and exchange their views and know the recent economical techniques evolved by them.
- 11. Student seminars and symposiums are organised to transfer the knowledge gained during the visit.
- 12. The information gather by the staff is transferred to larger community with the collaboration of the Government and non-Governmental agencies.
- 13. Students and teachers visit drought prone areas to initiate water shed development projects in communities and villages of surrounding area where there is scarcity of water and rain fed activities.
- 14. Students and staff who are involved in these activities take initiative and practice "Watershed Management" in their own backyards in their villages.

Evidence of success:

The students with the rural background are very much influenced by this programme and they very much appreciate the staff's involvement in the project. And this project is very useful as it is a basic requirement for the betterment of their village. Town students try to understand the hardships of the villagers experienced in their lives. And the villagers understand the proper steps to be taken by them at an appropriate time to withstand the drought condition of their area and measures to be taken overcome the future crop failure, and ground water management. The Government agencies are also involved in the programme, and think how best they can extend their technical and economic assistance to the needy at a proper time.

Problems encountered and resources required:

Due to the shortage of time in hectic semester system the students and staff may not get adequate time for the study and tackle the problem. And a year long visits to the villages at different intervals of seasons are not possible due to lack of time. Every time the staff may not accompany students in their study, due to the hectic time schedule. In some villages or some villagers may not adequately respond to the concerns of the students and government agencies. Financial assistance to the programme may not be sufficient for elaborate study and assistance.
